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The History of Everyday Objects

Some everyday objects have really interesting histories. Read about five of them.

Wallpaper

Today, wallpaper makes people's homes look nice, but the first wallpaper in China 2000 years ago helped to keep homes warm. In the 1600s, the Chinese introduced wallpaper to other countries. At that time, people with a lot of money put material on their wall. Only people without much money bought wallpaper. Later, wallpaper became popular with everyone.

The battery

In Baghdad, Iraq, some people have found what they think was a very early battery from over 2,250 years ago, but Alessandro Volta made the first true battery in 1800. In 1859, Gaston Planté made a battery that is similar to the ones we use in cars today. In the middle of the 20th century, businesses began to make small, light batteries for everyday objects like radios.

The pencil

In the 1500s, the English found a large amount of graphite (the material in a pencil). It was soft and it needed something to hold it together, so they put it inside wood. In 1795, Nicolas-Jacques Conté found a way to bake the graphite so he could change how soft or hard the graphite was in the pencil – companies today use this same process.

Jeans

In 1853, Levi Strauss of California, US was selling dry products, including a material called 'denim'. His customer Jacob W Davis bought denim from Strauss and made some trousers with it. Davis used metal in some places to stop the trousers from getting holes. The jeans were strong and so Davis decided to make and sell them. Levi Strauss helped him.

The sofa

Rich and important Egyptians first used sofas 4,000 years ago. Sofas were later popular with all kinds of Romans – rich and poor – but the cheap sofas were not soft like they are today. They were hard. From 400 CE to the late 1500s, people didn't use sofas regularly, but they became popular once more in the 1900s because companies could make them cheaply and easily.
