The Empire State Building

The Empire State Building is the top place to see for first-time visitors to New York City. This tall building was part of a competition between New York City businessmen Walter Chrysler and John Raskob for the construction of the world's tallest building. Engineer William Lamb was paid to produce the plans for the buildings, and John Raskob and Pierre du Pond's company paid for the Empire State project.

The other project in competition for this title, 40 Wall Street, was under construction when work on the Empire State Building began on March 17, 1930. The Empire State project was completed on April 11, 1931, sooner than planned. The building was opened for business by Herbert Hoover on May 1, 1931. However, due to the great economic crisis of that time, lots of the offices in the building were not rented for several years.

When visiting the Empire State Building, prepare for long ticket lines on the first floor, especially on weekends. You should wear warm clothes if it's cold and windy, so check the temperature before you go. Tourists buy one ticket to visit the 86th floor and another one for the 102nd floor, which offers interesting 360-degree views of the city. Book your tickets online to save money. To go up to the higher floor, tickets are only available on the 80th floor, where you can learn about the history of the building.

During the last holidays, we had no cell phones to amuse ourselves. What saved me was the single book "The Silver Crown," by Robert C. O'Brien. Reading that book at that time turned one of the worst parts of traveling — the real traveling — into a break of happiness.

I can't remember what I did the rest of the weekend, but it was the best plane trip I've ever taken, and it forever made me think that a vacation book doesn't need to have a connection with where you are; it can be a destination in itself. By taking you out of your head in those relaxing moments, it can restore you to yourself. It cures your negative feelings, stops your anxiety and provides stability and decision.

The works of traditional travel writers take readers on two trips at once. One is the physical and intellectual trip, and the other is the emotional trip. What books do you read on your trips? I generally choose mine in the manner of a bride organizing her "something old, something new" accessories. So, I take four types of books with me: one recent book that I've been saving as a reward; one book that I've been meaning to read but have not yet; one amusing thriller; and one comforting old friend, often a children's book, which has the benefit of having the world's library at your fingertips.

If you do it right, you will get off the plane so enamored of your book that you'll want to keep reading in the customs line, and then continue while waiting for your luggage, and then in the hotel to help you relax before going to sleep.
