**A. Read the magazine article.****WAITING AS A WAY OF LIFE**

Merhan Nasserri waits patiently on a bench in Charles de Gaulle Airport, suitcases stacked neatly beside him. If his clothing looks rumpled, and his suitcases a bit frayed, it's hardly surprising—after all, Nasserri has been waiting for a flight to London for over 17 years. What began as a travel nightmare on August 26, 1988, has become a way of life. Meet the man who lives in Charles de Gaulle's Terminal One.

Nasserri's odyssey began in 1977, when he was expelled from his home country of Iran for his political views. Forced to abandon his family, Nasserri headed to Europe, where he bounced from country to country until finally, in 1981, he obtained refugee status from the United Nations. Granted the right to live in any European country, Nasserri boarded a flight to Great Britain, where he has relatives. On a stopover in Paris, however, his bag containing his identity papers was stolen. Without these documents, British immigration officials refused to allow Nasserri into Great Britain, and he was returned to France. Back at Paris's Charles de Gaulle Airport, Nasserri found himself in the ultimate travel nightmare. Without identifying documents, he could neither enter France nor travel to another nation. He had become a man without a country.



With nowhere to go, Nasserri made Terminal One his home while he waited for a decision from the French government. According to airport workers, Nasserri has settled into a routine. Before passengers arrive, he awakens each morning at 5:30 on the bench where he spends each night. He shaves and brushes his teeth (using toiletries from free airline travel kits) in the men's room. Careful about appearing tidy, he washes his clothing once a week in the sink and keeps his belongings neatly organized in suitcases and boxes. Nasserri spends much of the day reading—keeping up with current events with the latest newspapers and magazines.

The would-be traveler has been befriended by airport employees, who call him "Sir Alfred" and look after him—donating meal vouchers, pocket money, and clothing and lifting his spirits with coffee and conversation on their breaks. He receives weekly visits from the airport doctor, who worries that his confinement has affected his mental health. Now the subject of several documentaries and movies (most notably, Stephen Spielberg's *The Terminal*, starring Tom Hanks), Nasserri's popularity has extended beyond Terminal One. He receives hundreds of letters at the airport each year.



In 1999, Nasserri was finally granted French residency, allowing him to leave the airport and live in France. However, Nasserri refused to leave until allowed to live in Great Britain. Friends worry that, after being confined to the terminal for so long, Nasserri may be afraid to leave. In a magazine interview he said, "I'm happy. This is my dream world. I don't have any worries."
