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Part 2: Emergency Case Study & Actions

Read the scenario below and answer the management questions that follow.

The Case of "Barnaby"

It is a frosty Tuesday morning in late October. You walk into the barn to feed Barnaby, a 10-year-old gelding. Usually, Barnaby whinnies and paces his stall when he hears the grain bin open. Today, he is lying down flat on his side. When you shake the grain bucket, he ignores you and refuses to get up

You walk into his stall and gently encourage him to stand. Once up, he completely ignores his breakfast bucket. Instead, he begins repeatedly pawing the ground, kicking up at his belly with his hind legs, and twisting his neck around to stare directly at his flanks. Within a few minutes, he drops heavily back to the ground and tries to roll over back and forth.
