Worksheet 2C: Verbs we don't usually use in the continuous form

There are a few verbs that we don't usually use in the continuous form.

However, the present continuous can be used with verbs like *look, be, want, love, have, feel* with a different meaning, for example:

Jennifer looks nice in her new dress.

Depending on the context, this sentence could refer to 'always' or 'at the moment'

Jennifer is looking nice today.

This sentence highlights that we mean that she looks nicer than usual.

Understand is not usually used in the present continuous. We understand from the context if 'understand' refers to something that is happening now or something that is always true, e.g.

I don't understand what you've just said. (now only)

I understand our English teacher very well. (I always understand her.)
