

# A Magical Capital Adventure

You know that the first word of a sentence is always capitalized. Here are other rules to remember when you write.

## Capitalize

- *the names of people, magical creatures, and pets.*  
**My friend, Hermione Granger, has an owl and a cat, Crookshanks.**
- *titles of respect such as Professor, Mrs., Mr., Miss, and Ms.*  
**Professor Snape and Mrs. Weasley met Harry at the station last week.**
- *the names of days, months, and holidays, but not the seasons.*  
**Harry got his letter on the Tuesday before Halloween last fall.**
- *titles of relatives when they are used as a name.*  
**I can't own a dragon because Mum and my uncle are allergic to fire.**
- *names of places, buildings, and monuments.*  
**I am taking care of Hedwig while Harry and his friends are on a trip to London. They are going to visit Diagon Alley and King's Cross Station.**
- *direction words when they name a region.*  
**We live in the Southwest. Harry and his friends flew north yesterday morning.**

## And the Champion Is . . .

As a writer, you need to know how to use commas to let readers know where to pause when reading a sentence.

Use a comma

- after each item in a series of three or more, except after the last item.  
**Harry packed his wand, cloak, and broomstick.**
- to set off the name of the person you are addressing directly.  
**Will you brew this potion with me, Ron?**
- after introductory words like *yes, no, and well*.  
**Well, I think the tournament rules are unfair.**
- to set off an appositive from the rest of the sentence.  
**The Marauder's Map, a magical piece of parchment, shows everyone at Hogwarts.**
- before a conjunction that joins two sentences.  
**Harry entered the tournament, but he never expected to be chosen.**
- after a dependent clause that begins a sentence.  
**When the Goblet of Fire chose his name, Harry was shocked.**
- to set off words that interrupt the basic idea of a sentence.  
**Hermione, therefore, researched the spell in the library.**
- to separate geographical names and dates.  
**Harry was born in Godric's Hollow, England. The first task began Tuesday, November 24, 1994.**
