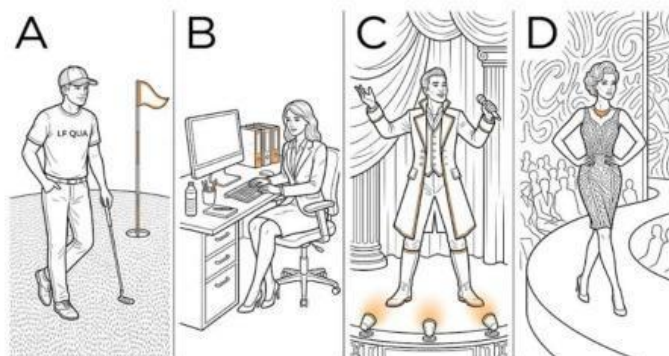

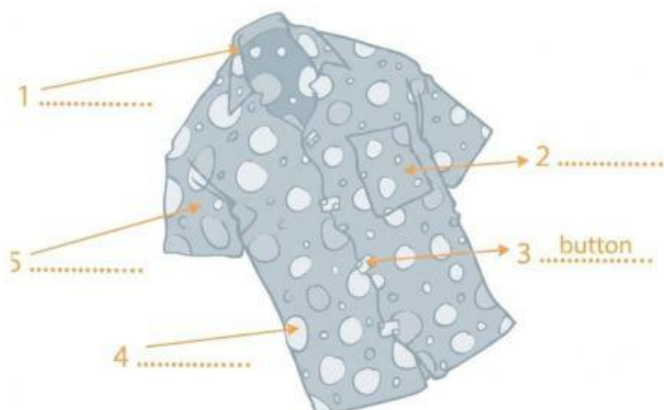

Comparatives & Superlatives



Most one-syllable adjectives form the comparative and superlative by adding -er and -est to the end of the word. Examples: tall → taller → tallest warm → warmer → warmest

Many adjectives with two or more syllables, and adjectives ending in -ed and -ing, form the comparative and superlative using more and most before the adjective.

Examples: useful → more useful → most useful tired → more tired → most tired

However, adjectives with two syllables that end in -y change the y to i before adding -er or -est.

Example: easy → easier → easiest

There are also some irregular adjectives that use completely different words for the comparative and superlative forms.

Example: good → better → best

You can make negative comparisons by using less or least with adjectives of two or more syllables. For one-syllable adjectives, use not as...as.

Remember: Use the comparative to compare two things or to say that something is nicer, more interesting, etc. than another thing. Use the superlative to say that something is the nicest, most interesting, etc. of all the things in a particular group.

Prefixes



Prefixes at the beginning of words can help you understand what the words mean. Sometimes words with prefixes have a hyphen (e.g. half-brother), and sometimes they don't (e.g. unhappy). Always use your dictionary to make sure.

Many prefixes are used to give adjectives, verbs, or nouns a negative meaning.

Common negative prefixes are: dis- • il- • im- • in- • ir- • un-

The prefixes *dis-* and *un-*, when used with verbs, can have two meanings: They can give a negative meaning (e.g. like → dislike). They can mean the opposite of an action (e.g. lock → unlock).

Other prefixes can give verbs specific meanings, for example: mis- = badly or wrongly, over- = too much, re- = again

Suffixes



Suffixes are added to the end of words to form new words. They help you change the word class, for example, to form nouns from verbs or adjectives. Some common noun suffixes are:

-ment, -(t)ion to make nouns from verbs. Examples: improvement, education

-ness, -ity to make nouns from adjectives. Example: happiness

-er, -or, -ist, -s to make nouns from verbs or other nouns in order to describe people and their jobs.

Examples: manager, writer

Common adjective suffixes include: -able • -al • -ful • -ible • -ive • -less • -ous • -y

These are used to make adjectives from nouns or verbs. Examples: famous, cloudy, helpful

Phrasal Verbs



A phrasal verb is a verb followed by one or two adverbs or prepositions.

Examples: wake up • get on with • look forward to

The meaning of a phrasal verb is usually very different from the meaning of the verb on its own.

Examples: look after • give up

A phrasal verb can have more than one meaning. You should always check its meaning in your dictionary.

Examples: pick up the phone • pick up a language

Phrasal verbs are very common in English. Most of them are informal and are used a lot in spoken English. Example: Did you make up that story? (= Did it come from your imagination?)

In your dictionary, phrasal verbs follow the entry for the main verb and are listed in alphabetical order.
