

## REVIEW - TYPES OF QUESTIONS - by teacher Angélica

**Yes/No Questions:** These questions are designed to elicit a simple "yes" or "no" answer. They typically begin with an auxiliary verb or the verb "to be."

For example: "Are you coming with us?" or "Did you finish your homework?"

**Tag Questions:** These are statements with a question tag at the end. They are used to confirm or clarify information and often seek agreement or disagreement.

For example: "You like chocolate, don't you?" or "We're meeting at 3 pm, right?"

**Choice Questions:** These questions present options and require the respondent to select one. They often begin with "which" or "would you rather."

For example: "Which color do you prefer?" or "Would you rather go to the beach or the mountains?"

**Open-Ended Questions:** These questions are designed to elicit more detailed and personalized responses. They often begin with "tell me about" or "describe."

For example: "Tell me about your favorite vacation" or "Describe your ideal job."

There are several types of "wh-" questions in English that are used to elicit specific information. Here are some examples of each type:

**WH-Questions:** These questions begin with a "wh-" word (what, where, when, why, who, whom, which, how). They are designed to elicit more detailed information and often cannot be answered with a simple "yes" or "no."

**What:** This question word is used to ask about a thing or an action.

For example: What is your favorite color? What did you eat for breakfast? What time does the movie start?

**Where:** This question word is used to ask about a location.

For example: Where is the nearest gas station? Where did you go on vacation last year? Where is the meeting taking place?

**When:** This question word is used to ask about a time or a date.

For example: When is your birthday? When did you start working here? When will the package arrive?

**Why:** This question word is used to ask about a reason or a cause.

For example: Why did you move to this city? Why do you like that movie? Why is the traffic so bad today?

**How:** This question word is used to ask about a manner or a method.

For example: How did you learn to play the guitar? How much does it cost to repair the car? How long will it take to finish the project?

**Who/Whom:** These question words are used to ask about a person or people. "Who" and "whom" are both pronouns, but they are used in different contexts.

"Who" is used as the subject of a sentence or clause, whereas "whom" is used as the object of a verb or preposition. To determine whether to use "who" or "whom," you can try replacing the pronoun with "he" or "him." If "he" sounds correct, then use "who," and if "him" sounds correct, then use "whom."

"Who" is used as the subject of a sentence or clause, meaning it refers to the person performing the action. For example, "Who is going to the party?" In this sentence, "who" is the subject, referring to the person who is doing the action of going to the party.

"On the other hand, "whom" is used as the object of a sentence or clause, meaning it refers to the person receiving the action. For example, "To whom are you speaking?" In this sentence, "whom" is the object, referring to the person who is receiving the action of speaking.

- Who is going to the party tonight?  
In this sentence, "who" is used as the subject of the sentence.
- Whom did you invite to the party tonight?  
In this sentence, "whom" is used as the object of the verb "invite."
- Who is responsible for this mess?  
In this sentence, "who" is used as the subject of the sentence.
- To whom should I address this letter?  
In this sentence, "whom" is used as the object of the preposition "to."
- Who called me last night?  
In this sentence, "who" is used as the subject of the sentence.
- Whom should I ask for help with this problem?  
In this sentence, "whom" is used as the object of the verb "ask."

## STRUCTURES IN DIFFERENT TENSES

### Present Simple:

- For yes/no questions: Do/Does + subject + base form of the verb.  
For example: Do you like pizza?
- For wh-questions: Wh- word + do/does + subject + base form of the verb.  
For example: What do you like to do in your free time?

### Past Simple:

- For yes/no questions: Did + subject + base form of the verb.  
For example: Did you go to the concert last night?
- For wh-questions: Wh- word + did + subject + base form of the verb.  
For example: Where did you buy your phone?

### Present Continuous:

- For yes/no questions: Am/Is/Are + subject + present participle (-ing).  
For example: Are you studying right now?
- For wh-questions: Wh- word + am/is/are + subject + present participle (-ing).  
For example: What are you doing tonight?

### Past Continuous:

- For yes/no questions: Was/Were + subject + present participle (-ing). Example: Were you watching TV when I called you?
- For wh-questions: Wh- word + was/were + subject + present participle (-ing). Example: What were you doing at 10 pm last night?

**Present Perfect:**

- For yes/no questions: Have/Has + subject + past participle.  
*For example:* Have you seen the new movie yet?
- For wh-questions: Wh- word + have/has + subject + past participle.  
*For example:* How many times have you traveled abroad?

**Past Perfect:**

- For yes/no questions: Had + subject + past participle.  
*For example:* Had you finished your homework before the party started?
- For wh-questions: Wh- word + had + subject + past participle.  
*For example:* What had you done before the police arrived?

By understanding the different types of questions, you can effectively communicate and gather information in various situations.
