Every year in June, people in Fairbanks, Alaska, celebrate the Midnight Sun Festival. This special day is near the summer solstice, when the sun does not go down at night. In Fairbanks, the sun rises in the north-east and stays high in the sky for almost 24 hours. The festival starts at noon and finishes at midnight. It is completely free for everyone.

More than 30,000 people come to the streets of downtown Fairbanks. There are many things to do. You can listen to live music on different stages. Local bands and singers perform all day and late into the night. There are also food stalls with hot dogs, ice cream and Alaskan specialities. Many people sell handmade crafts, clothes and souvenirs.

Children love the festival. They can try face painting, gold panning and play in a small skate park. Families walk around together and take photos under the bright sky. Even at 11 o'clock at night, the sun is still shining and the sky has a soft golden glow. People feel happy, healthy and full of energy because of the long daylight.

The Midnight Sun Festival is Alaska's biggest one-day event. Visitors and local people enjoy the long hours of daylight and the friendly atmosphere. Many say it is the best way to celebrate summer under the midnight sun.

In many places around the world, wild animals and humans share the same land. This is not always easy. Roads, cities and farms can destroy animal habitats. When animals try to cross busy roads, cars often hit them and they become injured. Some animals die.

To help animals, people have built special wildlife bridges and tunnels. These give animals safe access to the other side of the road. Many organisations work hard to protect animals and their habitats. They rescue injured animals and teach people how to coexist with wildlife.

We should not hunt animals just for fun or for no good reason. We must respect their right to survival. Domestic animals, like dogs and cats, live with us and we care for them. Wild animals need space and freedom. If we learn about their behaviour, we can avoid conflict and share the planet in a better way.
