Deaf and blind from the age of 19 months, Helen Keller faced extreme isolation as a child. Everything changed when her teacher, Anne Sullivan, helped her connect physical touch to the concept of language by spelling words into her hand. Driven by intense curiosity, Keller learned to read Braille, speak aloud, and ultimately became the first deaf-blind person to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree, dedicating her life to advocating for disability rights.

What is the main idea of this paragraph?

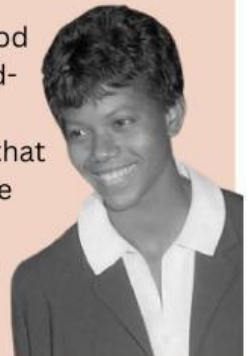

Diagnosed with polio as a child, Wilma Rudolph lost the use of her left leg and was told by doctors that she would never walk again. Through years of physical therapy and unwavering family support, she shed her leg braces by age twelve. Rudolph went on to pursue track and field, making history at the 1960 Rome Olympics by becoming the first American woman to win three gold medals in a single Olympic Games.

Long before leading the nation through the Civil War, Abraham Lincoln experienced a series of severe personal and political failures. Born into poverty and lacking formal education, he lost his mother at a young age, suffered business bankruptcies, and lost multiple elections for Congress and the Senate. Despite these relentless setbacks, Lincoln persevered, eventually becoming the 16th U.S. President and preserving the Union.
