

FCE Unit 2

Vocabulary development—beyond topic sets—is essential for the B2 level. Word formation, phrasal verbs and collocations are all important areas, so practice with these skills will be present in each lesson. (A FCE wordlist sent will be sent with this lesson.)

What follows is an exercise on collocations, which are words that commonly go together—for example *bitterly disappointed*. The habit among English-speakers is to describe disappointment with “bitterly”. Because collocations are words that are habitually put together—that is, not linked because of a grammatical need—you must memorize these collocations. Strong collocations like the following are tested in the exam.

Back to vocabulary, specifically **word formation**... Learn to recognize words that are formed from a common base word and record them together to help you remember them. For example, at B2 you should know the noun *truth*, the adjective *true* and the adverb *truly*. Word formation using prefixes and suffixes is tested in the exam. You will also need to know some words with negative prefixes, as in this word family: *happiness, unhappiness; happy, unhappy; happily, unhappily*. Many nouns have a related adjective formed with the suffix *-y*, as shown at the end of the dictionary example for *nerd*.

nerd /nɜːd/ noun [C] informal someone, especially a man, who is not fashionable and who is interested in boring things • **nerdy** adjective informal boring and not fashionable

The FC exam contains an exercise on word formation similar to the one below. There are two key skills in this exercise: (1) identifying the type of word—noun, verb, adjective, adverb—needed in each blank and (2) knowing how to change the base word to create the required word. Remember from PET: suffixes change the word type; prefixes change meaning—usually from affirmative to negative, as in the examples with *happy* above. [Review the chart of affixes and their functions that I sent last year.]

Remember:

- Nouns are often signaled by articles (*a, an, the*) and adjectives.
- Typical sentence order in English is S—V—O, so if the blank follows the subject, a verb is probably needed.
- Adjectives come before nouns, and they may be signaled by adverbs of degree (e.g., *very* or *more*).
- Adverbs typically describe actions—answering the question “how?”—but they can also modify/amplify other word types.
- Nouns always follow a preposition (as in the example).
- English and Spanish have many cognates. The fact can often guide you.
