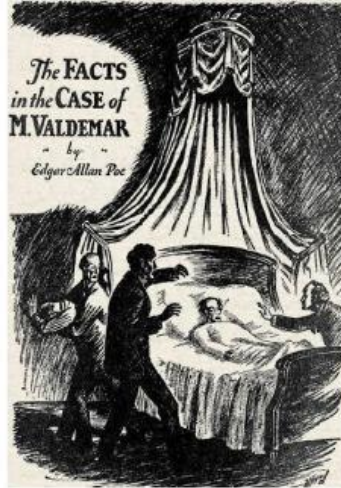


AMERICAN HORROR - Five Terrifying Tales

The type of hypnosis described (0) C Poe in his story “The Facts in the Case of M. Valdemar” was (1) _____ by a German scientist named Franz Anton Mesmer (1734–1815). Mesmer believed that diseases and illness (2) _____ be caused by blocking the electromagnetic forces of the body, (3) _____ he called “animal magnetism”. Mesmer performed his first experiments with magnets, (4) _____ later he developed a method of hypnotizing people. Mesmer first worked in Vienna (5) _____ he was forced to leave. He then went to Paris. At first Mesmer was (6) _____ successful. Once again, though, the local doctors began to protest. In 1785 a royal commission was set (7) _____ to investigate Mesmer’s methods. It included some of the most (8) _____ scientists of the day — Antoine Lavoisier, the founder of modern chemistry, the American Benjamin Franklin and Dr. Joseph Guillotin. Their report began, “Animal magnetism may exist without being useful, but it cannot be useful if it does not exist.” The report then described their scientific experiments that (9) _____ that “animal magnetism” did not exist. However, the commission did say that some diseases and illnesses were only in the patients’ imagination, and that perhaps Mesmer did cure these patients with his trance. Today, doctors recognize the effectiveness of hypnosis in treating (10) _____ psychological problems.

D. The epoch of the hoax

The Facts in the Case of M. Valdemar" first appeared in a magazine in 1845, but not as a short story – it was published as a true account of a scientific experiment. And it was widely believed. (0) **When** a newspaper man from Scotland wrote to its author – a not very famous writer named Edgar Allan Poe – and asked him whether it was true or not, Poe responded that the (1) _____ word to describe this piece of writing was hoax, or trick. Poe later wrote (2) _____ he lived in the "epoch of the hoax". (3) _____ are several reasons why hoaxes became so plentiful in the 1830s and 40s. First printing presses became powered by steam and (4) _____ print millions of newspapers in a day, for the first time in history. Then, the owners of newspapers soon discovered that nothing sold newspapers better (5) _____ extravagant and believable – at least for enough time to sell papers – hoaxes.

Before the article on M. Valdemar, in 1835 Poe (6) _____ already written another hoax article for a New York City newspaper. It was about a man (7) _____ went to the moon in a hot-air balloon. This hoax was not very successful, partly because another newspaper, The Sun, started publishing articles by (or so it said!) the famous astronomer Sir John Herschel. Herschel described a fabulous new telescope with (8) _____ he made many interesting discoveries, including life on the moon. He said that there were forests, seas, quartz pyramids, unicorns and even a Vespertilio-homo (Latin for "batman"!). The Sun never admitted that these stories were a hoax.

Poe had better luck with (9) _____ hoax, the Great Balloon Hoax of 1844. He wrote a newspaper article saying that Monk Mason (a real hot-air balloon pilot) had crossed the Atlantic Ocean in just three days – truly incredible when a ship took more than a month. Poe wrote in this article that, "The air, as well as the earth and the ocean, has been conquered (10) _____ science, and will become a common and convenient highway for mankind." This was not just exciting fiction (or, in other words, an entertaining lie). It was also great science fiction.
