

Practicing the Past Tense -ED

The -ed ending in regular past tense verbs and adjectives has three sounds: **/ɪd/** (an extra syllable / like *id* in *kid*), **/t/** (no extra syllable / crisp *t* sound), and **/d/** (no extra syllable / soft *d* sound). The sound depends on the final letter and vibration of the base verb.

The /ɪd/ Sound (Extra Syllable)

- Use this when the base verb ends with a **/t/** or **/d/** sound.
- Examples:
 - want → want-**ed** /wɒn tɪd/
 - need → need-**ed** /ni:d ɪd/
 - visit → visit-**ed** /vɪz ɪ tɪd/

OJO: Notice that the /pronunciation/ uses the phonetic alphabet that we studied in class.

The /t/ Sound (No Extra Syllable)

- Use this when the base verb ends in a **voiceless consonant** (sounds made in the mouth with no vocal cord vibration, like *p, k, s, ch, sh, f*).
- Examples:
 - help → help**ed** /helpt/
 - look → look**ed** /lʊkt/
 - watch → watch**ed** /wɒtʃt/

The /d/ Sound (No Extra Syllable)

- Use this when the base verb ends in a **voiced consonant** (vocal cords vibrate, like *b, g, v, z, m, n, l*) or a **vowel sound**.
- Examples:
 - play → play**ed** /pleɪd/
 - call → call**ed** /kɔ:lɪd/
 - love → lov**ed** /lʌvd/

OJO: It is not the final letter of the base verb but the final sound that determines the pronunciation of the past tense ending (-ED).

The rules are above. Now practice pronouncing the -ED ending until the correct form becomes habit. The exercise on the following page can help you. Listen to the pronunciation and repeat what you hear.

Optional: As an additional exercise, practice writing the phonetic transcription of the words. A chart with the phonetic alphabet can be found on the last page, and an example has been provided in each column.
