4. I think Pete's ideas are important and they deserve more than a comment.
5. My boss isn't nasty or unpleasant, but he has a habit of making slightly comments about my accent. Why does he do this, I wonder?
6. My tutor made some very comments on my essay – they were apt and to the point.
7. Ignore my comment. I wasn't thinking properly!
8. Last night's programme about homeless people in our cities was a comment on the current state of our society.

Notes

1. You can also use 'welcome' in 1-5.
2. In 1-6 notice that you can 'pass comment', but in 1-2 you 'make a comment'.
3. In 2-3 you can also say 'derogatory comments'.
4. In 2-8 'comment' is used to mean a bad picture of something. You can also use 'telling':
It's a telling comment on our society that some children still don't get enough to eat.
5. Note these comment + verb collocations:
Her comments provoked an uncharacteristic outburst of anger from the Prime Minister.
The manager's comments do not represent the views of many of us. I, for one, disagree strongly.
6. Note the following prepositional phrases:
The minister at the centre of the scandal was unavailable for comment last night.
I was surprised when she accepted his decision without comment.
7. Note how we tell people that we do not wish to talk about something:
When asked if he was about to resign, the chairman replied 'No comment'.
8. Note the verbs we use to describe our reactions to comments:
Her comments offended me deeply.
I was secretly pleased by his comments.
