8. If you're trying to get to Faversham, I'm afraid you're going in the direction. You must have missed the turn-off a few miles back.

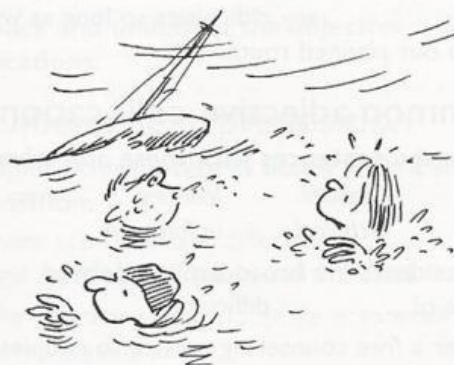

2. Note the following expressions:
*Many believe that the decision to cut interest rates is a step in the right direction to economic recovery.
I clearly need a change of direction at work. I'm bored doing the same thing every day.*
3. 'Directions' can mean 'written instructions':
*Don't forget to read the directions on the packet before taking the pills.
Just follow the directions on the packet and you will end up with a perfect sponge cake!*
4. Note this more formal expression:
This is a step in the right / wrong direction.
