

COMPOUND ADJECTIVES WITH NUMBERS

A Long Weekend in New York

Last summer, I went to New York with two friends. We had **a four-day trip** and stayed in a **three-star hotel** near Times Square. Our hotel room was quite small, but it had a **large-screen TV** and a **twenty-four-hour reception**.

On our first day, we took **a two-hour walking tour** around Manhattan. It was a **well-organized tour**, and our guide showed us many interesting places. We also visited a **five-story museum** and spent almost three hours there.

On the third day, we took a **one-hour train ride** to Brooklyn. We had lunch at a restaurant that offered **fifteen-dollar meals**. It was a great experience, and although the trip was tiring, it was definitely **a once-in-a-lifetime experience!**

GRAMMAR: COMPOUND ADJECTIVES WITH NUMBERS

A compound adjective is made of two or more words that work together to describe a noun.

NUMBER + HYPHEN + SINGULAR NOUN

Examples:

- a three-day trip
- a two-hour flight
- a five-minute break
- a ten-page report

Important: The noun in the compound adjective is always singular.

✗ a three-days trip
✓ a three-day trip

✗ a two-hours class
✓ a two-hour class

1. NUMBER + TIME WORD

We commonly use compound adjectives to describe duration.

- a two-hour meeting
- a three-day vacation
- a five-minute break

- a six-month course
- a ten-year contract

Compare:

The meeting lasted two hours.

It was a two-hour meeting.

In the first sentence, hours is a normal plural noun. In the second, two-hour is a compound adjective, so hour is singular.

2. NUMBERS + OTHER NOUNS

Compound adjectives with numbers can describe many different things.

Distance: a 100-kilometer journey / a 50-mile race

Age: a ten-year-old boy / a six-year-old building

Pages: a twenty-page report

Floors: a fifteen-story building

Money: a twenty-dollar meal / a five-dollar ticket

3. USE HYPHENS

Use hyphens to connect the words in a compound adjective.

- a three-hour flight
- a ten-page essay
- a twenty-dollar ticket
- a six-month course

4. COMPOUND ADJECTIVES WITH AGE

When describing someone's age, use:

number + year + old

- a ten-year-old child
- a twenty-five-year-old student
- a sixty-year-old man

Notice that year is singular.

✗ a twenty-five-years-old student

✓ a twenty-five-year-old student
