What Is Close Reading?

Close reading means carefully examining a text to understand its specific details, word choices, structure, evidence, and deeper meanings.

When close reading, readers ask:

- What specific words stand out?
- What evidence does the author provide?
- Why did the author choose this particular word or phrase?
- What literary techniques are being used?
- What can I infer from the details?
- How does the author's language affect the meaning or tone?

What Is Big Picture Reading?

Big picture reading means stepping back to understand the overall meaning, purpose, main idea, themes, and message of a text.

When reading for the big picture, readers ask:

- What is the text mostly about?
- What is the author's main purpose?
- What is the central idea?
- What is the overall theme or message?
- How do the major ideas connect?
