

OTHER WAYS TO EXPRESS THE FUTURE

A Very Busy Month Ahead

Next month **is going to be** particularly busy for Laura. She **is due to** start a new position at an international company on September 15th. Before that, she **is about to** attend a training course that will prepare her for her new responsibilities.

The company **is expected to** launch a new product later this year, and Laura will be part of the marketing team responsible for promoting it. According to her manager, the product **is likely to** become very popular among younger customers.

Laura has already made several plans. She **is meeting** her new colleagues next Tuesday, and **she is flying** to Madrid at the end of the month for a business conference. She has also arranged to meet an old university friend while she is there.

There are still some things she needs to organize. She **is supposed to** receive her new laptop before the training course, although there has been a delay with the delivery. If everything goes according to plan, she will have completed her training by the time she starts her new job.

Laura knows the next few weeks **are going to be** demanding, but she is excited about what lies ahead.

GRAMMAR: OTHER WAYS TO EXPRESS THE FUTURE

English has several ways to talk about future events. The choice depends on how certain the event is, whether it has been arranged, or whether it is expected to happen.

1. Be about to + infinitive

Used for something that will happen very soon.

- The meeting is about to start.
- Hurry up! The train is about to leave.

We normally use this for the immediate future, not for distant plans.

2. Be due to + infinitive

Used for something that is scheduled or expected to happen at a particular time.

- The plane is due to arrive at 8:30.
- She is due to start her new job next Monday.

It is especially common for official schedules, timetables, and arrangements.

3. Be supposed to + infinitive

Used when something is expected, planned, or arranged to happen.

- The technician is supposed to arrive this afternoon.
- We are supposed to finish the project by Friday.

It can also express an expectation or obligation: You are supposed to wear a uniform at work.

4. Be expected to + infinitive

Used when we believe something will happen because it is predicted or considered likely.

- Sales are expected to increase next year.
- The new restaurant is expected to become very popular.

This structure is common in news, business, and formal English.

5. Be likely to + infinitive

Used to say that something has a high possibility of happening.

- She is likely to get the promotion.
- Prices are likely to rise next year.

Be unlikely to expresses a low possibility: The company is unlikely to change its policy.

6. Present Continuous for future arrangements

Used for personal arrangements that have already been organized, often with a specific time or place.

- I am meeting my manager tomorrow.
- We are flying to London next Friday.
- She is having dinner with her clients tonight.

7. Simple Present for schedules and timetables

Used for official schedules and fixed programs.

- The train leaves at 7:45 tomorrow morning.
- The conference starts next Monday.
- The flight arrives at 10:20.
