Same idea...
different
number!

Change the whole sentence, not just the noun.

1. Demonstrative adjectives

this → these

that → those

2. Articles

a / an

→ no article
in plural

a cat → cats
an apple → apples

3. Nouns

Add -s or -es
(regular nouns)

book → books

dish → dishes

Some nouns change
(spelling or irregular).
See the box below!

4. Verbs

Change the verb
to match the subject.

is → are

was → were

has → have

5. Pronouns / Possessives

Sometimes pronouns
or possessives
also change.

his foot → his feet

a child → children

Look at the examples!

Same meaning...
just a different number!

Singular (one)



This apple is sweet.



Can you wash the dish?



A child is playing at the park.



That boy is running.



We will have a quiz.



I saw some people there.



Are those kangaroos?



We have some famous heroes.



There are many wolves there.



He hurt his feet.

Plural (more than one)



These apples are sweet.



Can you wash the dishes?



Children are playing
at the park.



Those boys are running.



We will have quizzes.



I saw one person there.



Is that a kangaroo?



We have a famous hero.



There is a wolf there.



He hurt his foot.

★ Common irregular plurals

child → children	wolf → wolves
person → people	hero → heroes
foot → feet	kangaroo → kangaroos

Remember! 💡

- ✓ 1. Change the demonstrative (this ↔ these, that ↔ those).
- ✓ 2. Change the noun (add -s, -es or use the irregular form).
- ✓ 3. Check the verb (is → are, was → were, has → have).
- ✓ 4. Check articles and quantifiers (a/an → no article, some/many/one).
- ✓ 5. Read the whole sentence again!

★ Not every
word changes!
Keep words like
can, will, some, many
when they are
correct.
