

Future Perfect

Sometimes, when you talk about the future, you must also tell about things that will be *finished* or *over* before that future time. This is when you use the *future perfect*.

Future perfect verbs have three parts:

will + have + past participle

Examples:

She will start university in two years. She *will have finished* high school by then.

If we don't hurry, there will be no tickets left! Other people *will have bought* all the tickets.
