


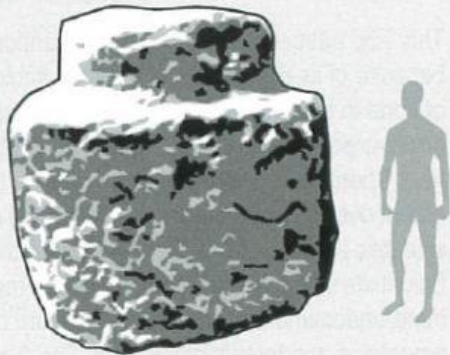

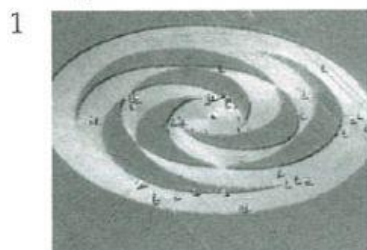
Easter Island is part of Polynesia and is a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

A bizarre theory

The strange and fascinating phenomenon of crop circles – which actually aren't simply circular but form intricate geometric ¹ patterns in farm fields – has inspired many possible explanations over the years. Crop-circle enthusiasts who prefer para-normal explanations for the circles believe that they must be messages left behind by ² _____ visitors, while more conventionally scientific-minded people have theorised that they might have resulted from natural ³ _____ forces, such as wind or heat. But now, there's another, even more bizarre explanation: ⁴ _____.

As the BBC News and many other news outlets are reporting, Lara Giddings, Attorney General for the Australian state of Tasmania, told a Parliamentary hearing that ⁵ _____ have been eating ⁶ _____ in fields that provide legal opium for morphine and other painkillers. Apparently, according to Giddings, the ⁷ _____ are eating the ⁸ _____ and then becoming so disoriented that they run around in the fields erratically, creating paths that resemble crop circles.

An official with an Australian poppy-cultivation company told ABC News that in the process of consuming the poppy-seed capsules, the ⁹ _____ often also eat some of the substances that cause opium's hallucinogenic effect in ¹⁰ _____. The weird suggestion that animals may have been the cause of Australian crop circles, however, doesn't really explain the crop-circle phenomenon. Are they capable of creating the sort of intricate geometric ¹¹ _____ seen in most crop circles? What about the crop circles found thousands of kilometres away from Australia, in the UK?

This odd explanation also doesn't account for the alternative view that crop circles are nothing more than elaborate jokes. A University of Oregon physicist, Richard Taylor, speculates that crop-circle ¹² _____ may now be using increasingly sophisticated ¹³ _____ such as GPS devices and laser pointers to burn complex ¹⁴ _____ into fields.
