big	bigger	adjectives ending one vowel + one consonant: double consonant, add -er
hot	hotter	
dry	drier	one- or two-syllable adjectives ending consonant + y > -ier
healthy	healthier	
famous	more famous	two- or more syllable adjectives: <i>more</i> + adjective
expensive	more expensive	
good	better	irregular
bad	worse	
far	further

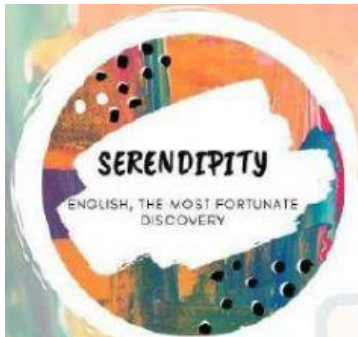
