Columbus and the Columbian Exchange

When Christopher Columbus made landfall with his (31) in the Bahamas in October 1492, two worlds with separate evolutionary histories met. The (41) Of labor caused by pathogens indirectly led to the establishment of African slavery among European immigrants in the Americas, resulting in the importation of malaria and yellow fever from Africa, causing even more (42) of the Native American population. The export of American flora and fauna did not revolutionize the Old World the way the influx of European agriculture (43) the New World ecosystem.
