Examples:

I want to take *a* summer course.
I will take *an* acrobatics class.

Use **a** before words that begin with a consonant sound and **an** before words beginning with a vowel sound.

Examples:

a singing lesson; *an* acting lesson

Use the definite article **the** when there is only one example that you know of.

Examples:

the cooking course at Dine Inn
the course at *the* local sports center

Don't use definite or indefinite articles with **uncountable** or plural nouns.

Examples:

I give help and advice. (NOT "a help" or "an advice")
This course is for artists. (NOT "the artists")
I will take acting lessons. (NOT "the acting lessons")
I'm not very good at cooking. (NOT "the cooking")
