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Grammar Reference



* **Conditionals** are clauses introduced with *if / when*. The **main types** are:

Type 0
Type 1
Type 2
Type 3

* There are **two parts**: *if-clause (hypothesis)* + the *main clause (result)*

When the *if-clause* comes **before** the *main clause*, the two clauses are **separated with a comma**.

If the weather is good tomorrow, we will go to the beach

hypothesis

result

Type 0 (general truth) - to express **something which is always true**.

If/When it rains, the roads get slippery and dangerous.

Type 1 (real present) - to express **real or very probable situations in the present or future**

If we work hard, we will finish the project on time.

Type 2 (unreal present) - to express **imaginary situations which are contrary to facts in present and therefore, are unlikely to happen in the present or future**; - for giving advice

If I didn't have to work such long hours, I wouldn't be so tired.

Type 3 (unreal past) - to express **imaginary situations which are contrary to facts in the past**;
- to express **regrets or criticism**

If I had been more careful, I wouldn't have made such a big mistake.

We use the verb **wish** and **if only** to express a wish.

* When we want to say that we would like something to be different in the present we use: **Wish/if only + past simple**

I wish/if only I didn't have to take the train to work every day.

* When we want to express **regret** that something happened or did not happen in the past we use: **Wish/if only + past perfect**

I wish/if only I hadn't stolen the motorbike.

* For polite imperative we use: **Wish/if only + would**

I wish you would pay more attention!

* This structure is also used to express our desire for a change in a situation for someone's behavior:

I wish/if only she wouldn't give me so much work.
