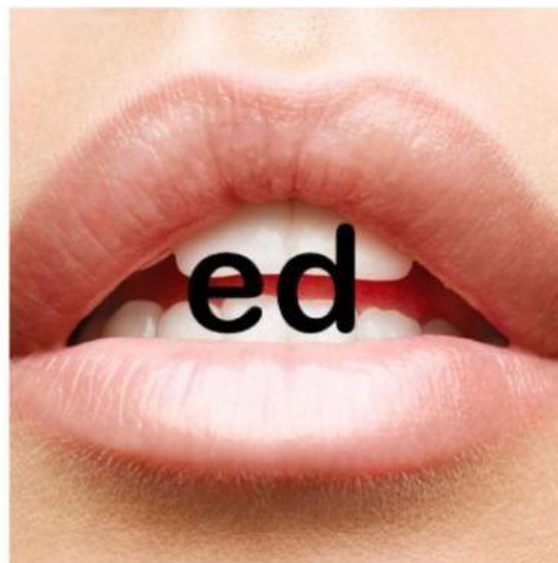


ED PRONUNCIATION



1 How to pronounce ed – SELF STUDY

'Ed' at the end of regular verbs in the past tense is pronounced in different ways.

Ed endings:	/t/	/d/	/ɪd/ (id)
	Regular verbs that end in an unvoiced (consonant) sound such as /p/, /f/, /s/, /k/, /ʃ(sh)/, /tʃ(ch)/. Unvoiced sounds are not made by your throat, but by pushing air through your mouth.	Regular verbs that end in a voiced (consonant) sound such as /b/, /g/, /v/, /z/, /ʒ/, /ʒ(j)/, /m/, /n/, /ŋ/, /l/, /th/, /r/. Voiced sounds are made by your throat.	Regular verbs that end in /d/ or /t/ end in an /ɪd/ sound. The sound is id as in did.
How to make the sound	Touch your tongue to the ridge above your top teeth, and move it back quickly. When you make the sound there will be a small explosion of air. Your lips should be slightly apart.	Touch your tongue to the ridge above your top teeth, and move it back quickly. There should be no explosion of air. Your lips should be slightly apart.	Start by making the 'i' sound, where the tongue is curved up towards the top of the mouth. Then move the tongue forward to make the 'd' sound.
Examples:	like - liked look - looked	Live (v) - lived open - opened	need - needed want - wanted
